Day of Absence & Day of Presence Update

What is it?

Although there have been many changes and additions over the years, the purpose of these days is to invite the entire campus community to celebrate and to explore the richness of our diversity by participating in dialogue, activities, workshops, seminars, performances and perspectives. Every year new and different programming is developed by the Day of Absence and Day of Presence Planning Committee which is comprised of students, staff and faculty. These last few years we have put together calendars of events that span the entire year. The theme this year is, “The Challenge of Community”. Through workshops, guest lecturers and art we will be exploring and issues of allyship and intersections of identity.

This year there are also two full days of programming: April 25, The Day of Absence and April 27, The Day of Presence. (For those of you who may be unfamiliar with this yearly observance, check our FPAS website and read a brief history of the ideas behind our tradition by following the link at the start of this newsletter.)

The Day of Absence off-campus full-day event on April 25, is an off-campus educational and rejuvenating retreat which all of Evergreen’s students, staff and faculty of color are invited to attend. In addition, while the community of color is off-campus, white allies offer a full day of programming on campus around identity development and anti-oppression work. The Day of Presence on April 27 represents the reuniting of our entire community and an opportunity to share ideas with each other as allies around the issues of multiculturalism and community strength.

What is the purpose of separation?

One of the questions we are often asked is, “Why does the campus separate? Doesn’t that defeat the purpose of unity?” The departure which takes place on Day of Absence is easier to understand if seen from the perspective of coalition and community-building. For people of color, the opportunity we have in the larger society to explore ideas, problems and solutions to issues of diversity in our own community without having to explain, defend or interpret our perspectives, is rare, precious and absolutely essential. This retreat gives the campus community of color one day in the year when we can work together as a learning community, in a setting in which we are not the numerical minority.

At the same time, it is also equally important for our white allies to have a space for themselves dedicated to discuss these same issues of inclusiveness, identity, allyship and community.

Do you find strength in community?

If the answer is “no” for you, the significance of the day may be difficult to understand. The purpose of the day is for us as members of the same TESC community to come together as friends and strangers to be united and to learn more about ourselves and each other and to hopefully share a sense of community with one another. It is a great place to be just who you are.
