Message from Therese Saliba, Interim Vice President Inclusive Excellence and Student Success

Without community, there is no liberation. This quote from African American feminist Audre Lorde has been my mantra throughout the long months of the Covid pandemic. As we emerge from our separation, I want to applaud the work of the Center for Community-Based Learning (CCBLA), which remained at the heart of Evergreen's community support throughout these challenging days. While the pandemic limited some direct community engagement, we learned that community-based learning is not only relevant, but also essential to providing our community with basic needs, strategic support, justice, and care—the ingredients for our collective liberation.

This past year, we've forged some exciting cross-divisional community alliances between CCBLA, Student Activities, academic programs, and Inclusive Excellence and Student Success. From the Pop-Up Food Bank to the Advocacy Resource Center (ARC), we've been working together to foster the well-being of our students and community members.

As we return to our campuses this fall, we look forward to continued collaboration to strengthen our community support and partnerships. Our grant award for the WSAC Homeless College Student Pilot Program (2021-2023) includes funding for a caseload manager at Olympia's new Advocacy Resource Center and our Tacoma campus, as well as direct assistance to students experiencing homelessness. With CCBLA's leadership, Evergreen also received a full scholarship to Temple University's Hope Center Institutional Capacity-Building Cohort. Through extensive training and work sessions, Evergreen will continue to build collaborative ecosystems to meet students' basic needs and promote their academic success. Additionally, CCBLA continues to lead important initiatives in racial and social justice, from Gateways for Incarcerated Youth to Farmworker Justice Day. Special thanks to CCBLA Direc-

### Community Service Through Work Study

Evergreen Work Study Community Service is a collaboration with Student Employment. 13 Evergreen students worked 2,466 hours supporting 11local grassroots non profits, focusing on real community needs around fighting poverty, providing education to immigrant learners, confronting homelessness with innovative solutions, and offering crisis social services. ### Gateways for Incarcerated Youth

College Access Corps AmeriCorps member Kate Murphy supported incarcerated youth during this challenging COVID year. 10 Evergreen college class students served as academic mentors to 27 incarcerated youth at Green Hill School, DCYF Juvenile Rehabilitation facility. Mentor Washington provided Technical Assistance training for youth outcomes.

### The Gateways College Class

tively in a seminar style learning environment with youth. Gateways Program Coordinator Talib Williams supported faculty Maria Isabel Morales, who described the goal of Gateways: "to create an environment in which each person becomes empowered to share their knowledge, creativity, values, and goals by connecting respectfully with people from other cultural and sociopolitical

backgrounds." 16 incarcerated youth earned college credit in 2020-21; they also received Cares Act funds as enrolled students.

Evergreen's eleventh annual Farmworker Justice Day included Familias Unidas por la Justicia (FUJ) and Tabajadores Unidas por la Justicia (TUJ) farmworker unions, as well as the Community to Community (C2C) Promotoras. From the onset of the pandemic, farmworker activists at FUJ and C2C have pointed out the cruelty of being deemed "essential" workers, while being denied basic human rights and dignity. Workers have been vocally resistant to the systemic injustice in the agriculture system and the unique risks they've faced due to unsafe pandemic conditions. Faculty Maria Isabel Morales facilitated the online presentation.
