THE EVERGREEN FOOD BANK

Thanks to the Thurston County Food Bank, Evergreen provides food distribution twice a month to our Olympia campus and the broader community. It is supported by Washington Campus Coalition for the Public Good (WACC) AmeriCorps members, volunteers and student workers. Pop-up distributions happen in Parking Lot C on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of every month.



Between September 13th, 2022 and June 13th, 2023, the Evergreen Satellite Food Bank served:

- 147 new households
- 433 individual visits

BASIC NEEDS RESOURCE & ADVOCACY CENTER

The Basic Needs Advocacy & Resource Center opened in Spring 2021 and is an accessible space on campus for students to receive supplies, food, hygiene items, and other basic needs at no cost. Students can make appointments to visit the center and receive:

- Support applying for SNAP (food stamp) benefits or other emergency funding
- Hygiene Items
- Food Pantry & Shelf Stable Foods
- Donated Books
- A Gender-Affirming Clothes Closet
- Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)
- Plant cuttings & propagations

LEARN MORE ABOUT GATEWAYS:



49 youth were served for program year 2022-23.

Academic Mentoring Program (AMP) connected youth and college mentors for weekly workshops, participatory education, and community building. AmeriCorps member Ash Campbell asked the youth what they would like to learn, resulting in collaborations with Garden Raised Bounty (GRuB) to host workshops centered around food justice, cooking and culture, and native plant identification.

OSPI Building Bridges grant supported Gateways for a second year and connected with programs reengaging youth of color statewide.

Positions also supported the Campus Food Bank, Basic Needs Housing and Re-Entry Scholars.






STUDENT SURVEY DATA: 2022

In Fall 2022, students in 39 colleges and universities across the state participated in the WA Student Experience Survey administered by Western Washington University in partnership with the Washington Student Achievement Council. 161 students from Evergreen participated in the survey.

Comparing 2020 Real College Survey responses with 2022 responses, there was a reported 21% increase in food insecurity.



Evergreen students reported higher rates of food insecurity, housing insecurity, and homelessness than the state average.



SUPPORTING STUDENTS EXPERIENCING HOUSING INSECURITY

Leading the charge to support housing-insecure students at Evergreen for the past two years has been an honor and a journey. This academic year we served 72 students across more than 360 appointment hours, providing comprehensive case management and what students came to call "companioning" through many difficult moments.

The most common feedback we received was that students felt less alone in their housing searches, and in most cases, were able to secure stable housing on or off campus using our comprehensive student housing search guide and the support of our team.

Special thanks to Lurian Bristow for his patience and thoughtful support of students, as well as Dharma Koffer for their ability to research and navigate resources quickly and expeditiously. We were able to fund \$47,480 in housing subsidies to provide secure housing to students.

As I move from the Case Manager and Project Development role into full-time teaching in the fall, I also want to extend my deep gratitude to Ellen Shortt-Sanchez for the "companioning" and partnership she provided to all of us working on this new and beautiful project at Evergreen.

- Of Evergreen's former foster youth population, 89% experience food insecurity
- Of Evergreen's first-gen population, 64% experience food insecurity
- Of Evergreen's **students with disabilities** population, 63% experience food insecurity

LGBTQI+ Evergreen students struggled with food and housing insecurity

- 7 out of 10 LGBTQI+ students (72%) experienced some type of basic needs insecurity
- Of those students, nearly half of them (47%) experienced both housing and food insecurity
- 65% of LGBTQI+ students reported food insecurity
- 3 out of 10 LGBTQI+ students (28%) experienced homelessness in the last 12 months
