OLYMPIA CULTURE, TEXT, AND LANGUAGE SUBSET

The overall response rate for locatable members of the class of 2004-05 was 31%. Respondents identified their primary areas of study as presented in the following chart.

The following data include only responses from students who primarily attended the Olympia campus and who identified Culture, Text, and Language as their primary area of study or among their primary areas of study at Evergreen. 79 alumni respondents met these criteria.

- All 79 respondents earned BA degrees.

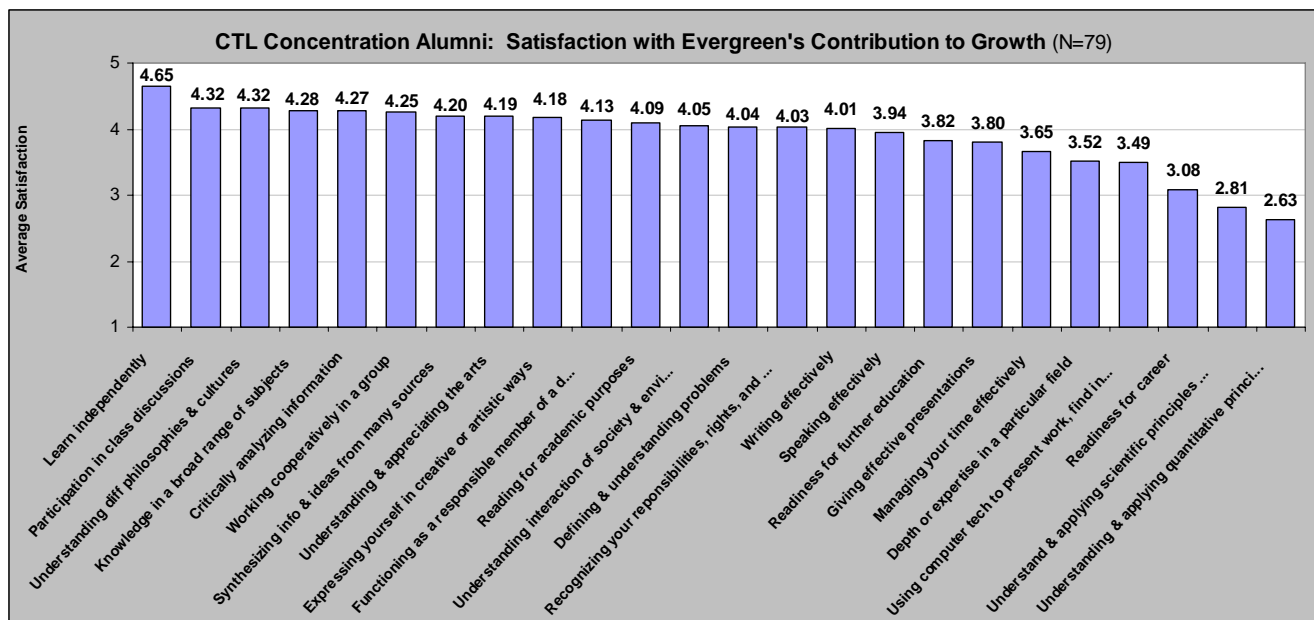
Evergreen's Contribution to Academic and Personal Growth

Alumni were asked to rate their satisfaction with Evergreen's contribution to their academic and personal growth in each of the following academic areas on a five-point scale from 1=not at all satisfied to 5=very satisfied.

The average satisfaction rating for each academic area was calculated and the results are presented in the next chart. Average ratings for learning independently, participation in class discussions, and understanding different philosophies and cultures were rated highest by the CTL alumni. Average satisfaction fell below the “somewhat satisfied” midpoint of the scale in the areas of understanding and applying quantitative principles and understanding and applying scientific principles.



Note: Satisfaction was rated on a five-point scale where 1=not at all satisfied, 2=little satisfaction, 3= somewhat satisfied, 4=mostly satisfied, and 5=very satisfied.

Work-related skills and abilities

Alumni rated their skill levels in a series of work-related activities. Then the alumni who rated their skill levels also rated how well the education they received at Evergreen prepared them in each area. The following table provides the frequencies of the alumni responses about their work-related skills. The most common rating category for each work-related skill is presented in bold print for emphasis.

Satisfaction with Evergreen Experiences

Alumni rated their level of satisfaction with a series of Evergreen educational experiences. They rated their satisfaction on a four-point scale from 1=very dissatisfied to 4=very satisfied. They also had the option of indicating if an educational experience did not apply to them.

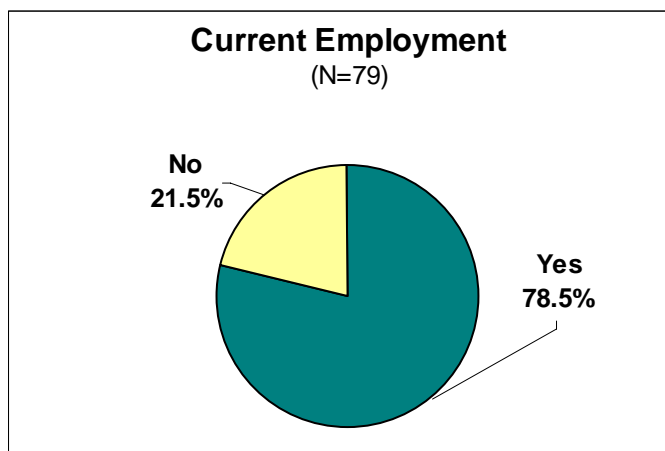

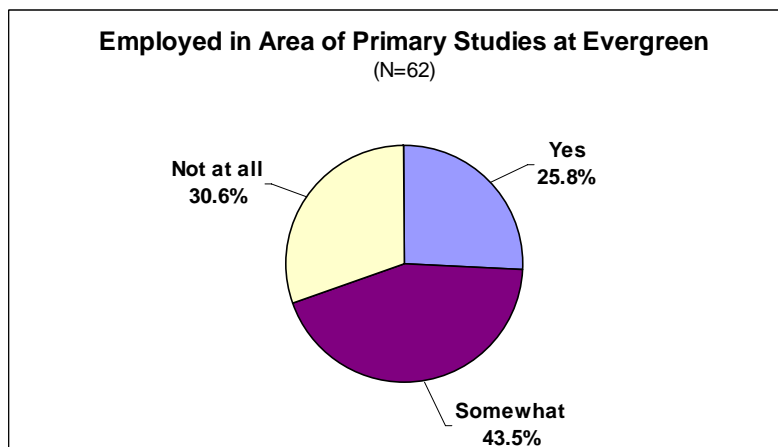
For students who participated in each activity, the most common response was that they were *somewhat satisfied* or *very satisfied*. Evergreen’s “interdisciplinary approach to education” and “narrative evaluation by the faculty” were the highest in satisfaction of the common Evergreen experiences. 24.4% of alumni were dissatisfied with “Opportunities for advanced undergraduate work at Evergreen”.

Alumni Employment Data



78.5% of the CTL concentration alumni were employed one year after graduation compared to 84% of all alumni respondents.

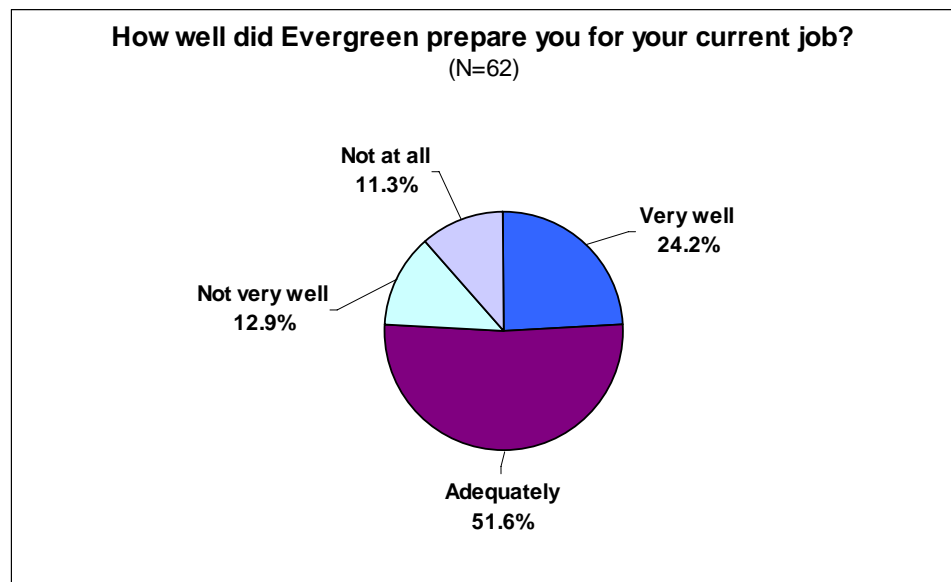
Of those who were employed, 69.3% of the CTL alumni were employed in an area that was at least somewhat related to their area of primary study at Evergreen.



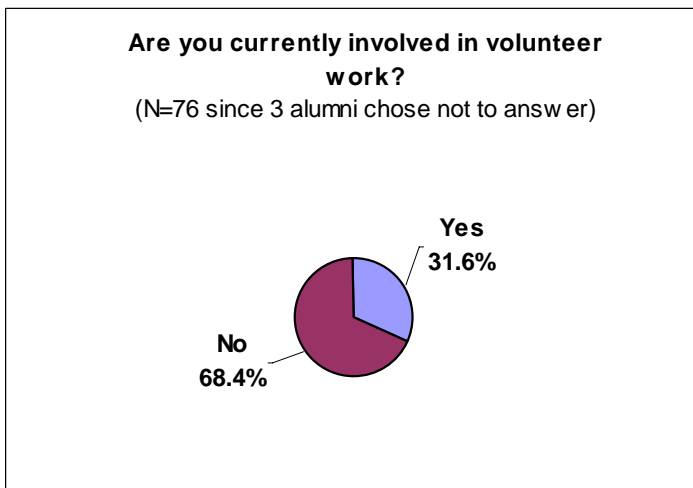
The 62 employed CTL alumni selected one category from the list below that they felt best described the type of work they were doing one year after graduation.

75.8% of the employed CTL alumni felt that their Evergreen experiences prepared them *adequately* or *very well* for their current employment.



Volunteerism



32% of the CTL concentration alumni were involved in volunteer activities one year after graduation compared to 34% of all alumni respondents

Graduate or Professional School

32% of CTL alumni applied to graduate/professional school within one year. Of the 24 alumni who applied 21 had been offered admission (87.5%) and 3 applications are still pending. No one has been denied thus far.

Of the 79 CTL alumni, 19 attended or are currently attending graduate or professional school within one year of graduating from Evergreen. The 19 alumni were continuing their work at in Washington (11), other states (6), and internationally (2). Two had enrolled graduate studies at Evergreen in this timeframe. This rate of 25% of alumni going directly to graduate school within one year is slightly higher than the 21% of all Evergreen alumni respondents who entered graduate school within one year of graduation.
