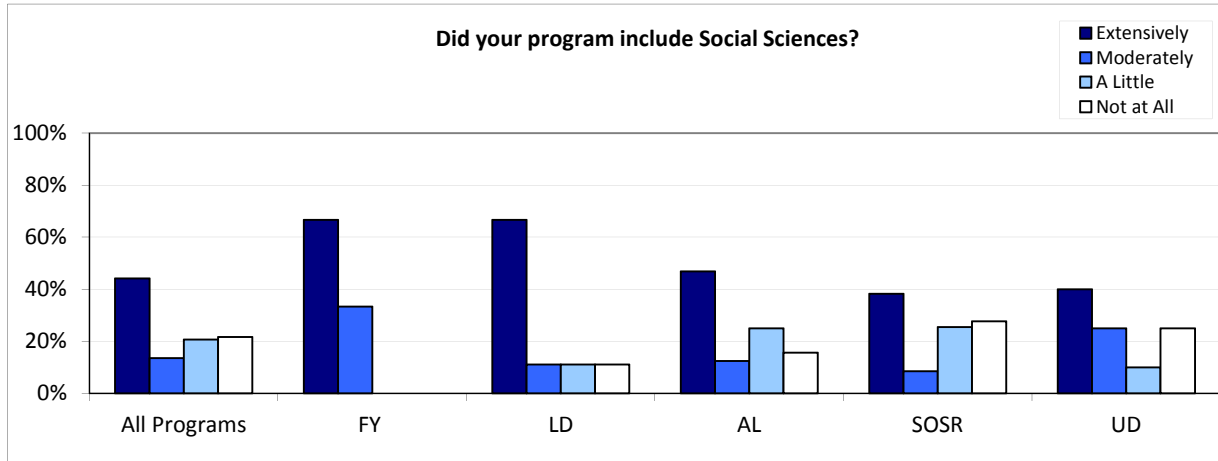
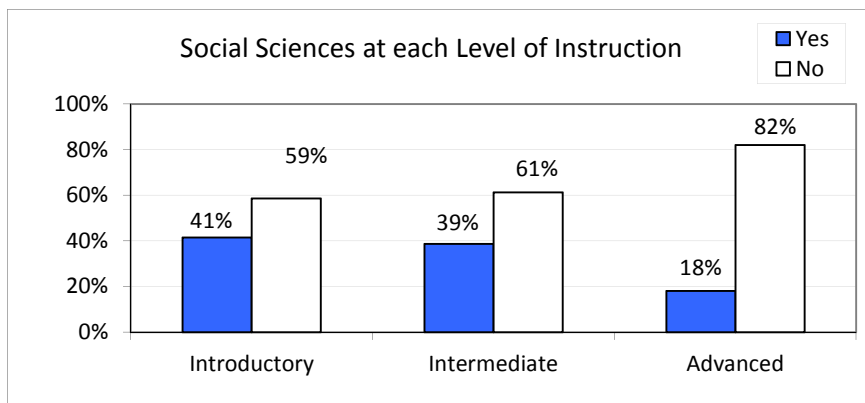


**End-of-Program Review 2014-15**

The presence of social sciences in the curriculum increased from 72% in 2013-14 to 78% in 2014-15. More than 80% of First-Year, Lower Division, and All Level programs included social sciences.

TRI: Rebuilding Native Nations-Strategies for Governance and Development (Port Gamble)	UD	Cindy Marchand-Cecil	Moderately			The Fall sub-theme, Tribal Administration was a nine-credit upper division core course taught as part of the Fall, 2014 curriculum for the Reservation-Based, Community Determined Program. This interdisciplinary course used a variety of methods, materials, and approaches to interpret, analyze, evaluate, and synthesize the impact of current and best Tribal Administrative practices to improve strategies for governance and development on 21st century Tribal communities. Students examined tribal administration, including areas of policy review, policy development, policy change and implementation, internal relationship building, organizational development, and employee management.

Through research, debate, critique, and analysis students gained an understanding of the impacts of various tribal administrative approaches on present day practices. In addition to supplemental materials selected by faculty, students read the following books: Crow Planet: Essential Wisdom from the Urban Wilderness, Re-Creating the Circle: The Renewal of American Indian Self-Determination, The Craft of Research, The State of the Native Nations: Conditions under U.S. Policies of Self-Determination, and Rebuilding Native Nations: Strategies for Governance and Development

The Winter quarter upper division core course "Ethics for Tribal Vitality, is an exploration of major ethical theories—Utilitarianism, Libertarianism, Kant's Categorical Imperative, Aristotle, John Rawles, and Communitarianism—and their applications to a variety of current issues. The course also explores various Native perspectives on ethics and the ways in which they are manifest in contemporary Native America. Students worked to understand the major ethical theories -- Utilitarianism, Libertarianism, Kant's Categorical Imperative, Aristotle, John Rawles, and Communitarianism and considered how different cultures have different ethical codes and how moral codes change over time.

They defined Native American ethical codes and how these relate to major philosophical theories of ethics and they looked at issues in creating an ethical organizational climate and ethical decision making and behavior. Students also developed the capacity to apply the major precepts of different ethical theories to real life issues through case writing and other work to demonstrate their ability to analyze some key leadership issues in Indian Country.

Additionally they came to a studied personal position in terms of their own ethical theory and worked to improve skills in writing, working in groups, and presentation. In addition to supplemental materials selected by faculty, students read the following books: Defining Moments: When Managers Must Choose between Right and Right, Justice: What's the Right Thing to Do? Meeting the Ethical Challenges of Leadership: Casting Light or Shadow, Power, and Who Speaks for Wolf?

						Profiles in Leadership, an upper division core course taught as part of the Spring 2015 curriculum explored leadership in both mainstream and tribal contexts examining how political and social forces create leaders and make history. In this course students studied: a) how and why individuals are called to leadership, b) how trust, power and authority is gained, c) what the characteristics and qualities of a great leader are, and d) in what ways constituents influence their leaders and leaders influence their constituents. They reviewed leadership across boundaries and in different arenas, how women's roles have changed over time, how leadership impacts the health of communities, and looked at the influence of political and social forces.
